## **Can You Handle Liberty?**

## I. Introduction:

- A. We should know that we are under the perfect law of liberty (**James 1:25**; **2:12**).
  - 1. As the wording suggests, the law we live under is not a burdensome law (I John 5:1-3).
  - 2. In Christ, things are just much more simple than they were under the Law of Moses (Matthew 11:27-30 and Acts 15:1-10).
- B. We want to stand fast in the liberty that we have in Christ (Galatians 5:1).
  - 1. Yet, that does not mean we are free from accountability (**II Corinthians** 5:10).
  - 2. Even in matters wherein something is lawful, that doesn't always mean we should/can do it (I Corinthians 6:12; 10:23-24).
  - 3. To turn to the flesh, to satisfy carnal desires, is contrary to the purpose of being in Christ (**Romans 8:1-8**).
- II. Body: The Law Was Given Because Man Transgressed, Couldn't Handle Liberty, Needed Fenced In (**Galatians 3:19** and **I Timothy 1:8-10**).
  - A. We can see in the first century that Christians struggled with freedom in the grace of Christ (**Romans 6:14-16**).
    - 1. So, we can see instructions given to reign things in (I Corinthians 11:16-22; 11:34).
    - 2. Yet, some went too far by creating unjust laws (I Timothy 4:1-5).
    - 3. Some went too far in taking the place of lawgiver (James 4:11-12).
    - 4. There are enemies of liberty (Galatians 2:1-5; 6:12-13).
    - 5. Liberty can be misused to do wrong (I Peter 2:16).
  - B. A law does not only need to be made because of sin. Consider the matter of maturity (I Corinthians 13:11; 14:20)?
    - 1. Think about parents and children (Proverbs 29:15).
      - a. Aren't rules put in place for younger children that ease and eventually cease to exist as they age (i.e. crossing streets)?
      - b. The same is true for Christians. Think about matters of conscience and the difference between the mature and immature Christian (I Corinthians 8:9-12).
    - 2. It is an indisputable fact that those who are spiritually immature lack the ability to discern good from evil (**Hebrews 5:11-14**).
    - 3. We have to know how to use our liberties without abusing those liberties (I Corinthians 7:31).
  - C. Search and try "our ways" (Lamentations 3:40).
    - 1. The Lord says we are to grow (**Ephesians 4:15** and **I Peter 2:1-2**), but He doesn't outline a specific route to growth. What are you doing to grow?
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- a. Rightly divide the Scriptures is the normal, quick answer (II Timothy 2:15). They searched daily is a quick answer too (Acts 17:10-11). What, specifically, though?
- b. What about application of that information you study (**Luke 6:46**)?
- c. What if studying is getting you nowhere (II Timothy 3:7)?
- d. What about relevant study (Titus 3:9)?
- 2. The Lord says to assemble (**Hebrews 10:23-25**) on the first day of the week (**Acts 20:7**). He gives us liberty to decide how long, how many songs, etc.
  - a. What if we use the liberty to decide what is expedient for us and end up shorting Him (Mark 12:30)?
  - b. Jesus, in all things, is supposed to have the "preeminence" [to be first] (**Colossians 1:18**).
- 3. The Lord says brethren are to serve on another (Galatians 5:13).
  - a. Isn't there balance in bearing one another's burdens and individual responsibility (**Galatians 6:1-5**)?
  - b. What about the strong bearing the weak (Romans 15:1-3 and I Thessalonians 5:14)?
    - i. Isn't there a limit (Romans 14:1)?
    - ii. Doesn't there have to be give and take (Romans 12:10 and Hebrews 3:13)?
    - iii. It's not wrong to be busy holding up others (**Matthew 25:36-40**). Yet, what about exhaustion (**Galatians 6:9**)?
- 4. The Lord says we should love life and see good days (I Peter 3:10) and Jesus shows the need for leisure (Mark 6:31).
  - a. What if we want to "take it easy" and such leads to us neglecting our responsibilities (**Proverbs 24:30-34**)?
  - b. What if our choices in leisure cause us to be tempted (**Mark** 14:38)?
  - c. What if our choices in enjoying this life brings shame on our Lord (Romans 2:24 and I Timothy 5:14)?
  - d. What if our leisure causes us to be unprepared for the coming of the Lord (Matthew 24:35-25:13)?
- 5. The Lord says be angry and sin not (**Ephesians 4:26**).
  - a. What if the liberty to become angry leads you to get angry quickly as you haven't sought to quench it (**Proverbs 14:17**, **Ecclesiastes 7:9**, and **James 1:19-20**)?
  - b. What if that liberty to be angry turns you into an angry person (**Proverbs 29:22**)?
- III. Conclusion: While we have liberty in Christ, the fact that we are under a law (again; **Galatians 6:2**) means we have to be doers of that law (**Romans 2:13**)!
