Do You Want To Be Judged Without Mercy?

I. Introduction:

A. Whenever we discuss points such as this, it is important to be sure we do not go to an incorrect extreme (**Deuteronomy 12:32**).

1. So we have to properly handle the Scriptures we will look at (**II Timothy 2:15**).

2. As it pertains to our subject matter, think of how the Pharisees knew one side of their law (**Deuteronomy 19:15-21**), but failed to see the whole matter (**Matthew 9:9-13**; cf. **Hosea 6:6** and **Micah 6:8**).

B. As we address the subject matter of mercy, it is important that we see the Scriptural boundaries. We are told to be merciful with the Lord as our example of such (Luke 6:36).

1. God's mercy does not mean that He unconditionally forgives sinners (**Proverbs 28:13**, **Nahum 1:3**, and **Luke 13:1-5**).

2. He teaches us to forgive conditionally as well (Luke 17:1-4).

3. Therefore, we must conclude that mercy does not equal forgiveness; but it does mean granting the opportunity for the process of repentance and ultimately forgiveness thereafter (**Nehemiah 9:1-32**).

II. Body: If We Show No Mercy... (James 2:8-13).

A. Would you want to face God without Him being merciful (**Psalms 90:11**, **Matthew 10:28**, and **Hebrews 10:26-31**)?

1. Mercy is: "compassion (human or divine, especially active): - (+ tender) mercy. Kindness or good will towards the miserable and the afflicted, joined with a desire to help them" (Strong's # G1656).

a. Mercy is a greater subject matter than things relative to forgiveness of sin (**Proverbs 14:21**; **31**).

b. While we focus so heavily on truth, consider the connection of truth with mercy (**Psalms 85:10** and **Proverbs 16:6**).

2. God's mercy is up to Him (Romans 9:14-15).

3. Do we take for granted what others have cried unto God for (**Psalms 86:3**)?

a. Have you erred since obeying the Gospel? Is that acceptable to God (**James 1:16**)?

b. Think about what Peter said to Simon (Acts 8:18-24).

4. Where would you or I be without His mercy (**Titus 3:5** and **I Peter 1:3**; **2:10**)?

5. How can we expect what we won't give (**Proverbs 21:13**)?

B. It is good for us to be merciful (Proverbs 11:17; 21:21).

1. We see mercy in God (**Psalms 103:8**).

2. God should see mercy in us (**Luke 6:27-36**). *Looked at verse 36 earlier in this lesson (introduction; B.).

C. Mercy and ultimately forgiveness, requires compassion (Matthew 18:15-35).

1. Compassion is an expected attribute of Christian (I Peter 3:8).

2. Learn to think like Jesus did (Matthew 15:32-39, Mark 6:34, and Luke 7:11-17).

3. Compassion isn't an expression of words, but an action rooted in proper love (**I John 3:14-18**).

D. When repentance/conversion occurs, you have to be willing to forgive (Mark 11:25-26 and Colossians 3:12-13).

1. The Lord is our pattern to follow (Ephesians 4:31-32).

2. Again, expect what you are willing to give (Luke 6:37-38).

III. Conclusion: "Blessed are the merciful: for they shall obtain mercy" (Matthew 5:7).
