## John 14:27-31

**John 14:27** "Peace I leave with you, my peace I give unto you: not as the world giveth, give I unto you. Let not your heart be troubled, neither let it be afraid."

- A. Jesus is the Prince of Peace (Isaiah 9:6).
  - 1. Jesus left them with a spiritual peace rather than a worldly peace (Romans 8:6, Philippians 4:7, and Colossians 3:15).
  - 2. In fact, this world does not offer peace to the faithful (**John 16:33**; cf. **John 15:18-20**).
  - 3. Jesus is our source of peace (Acts 10:36, Romans 5:1, and Ephesians 2:12-17).
- B. Jesus did not want the disciples to be troubled (John 14:1).
  - 1. He tried to help them to not be afraid (Psalms 56:4, Luke 12:4-5, and Revelation 2:10).
  - 2. Jesus will see to it that the disciples have the help they need (**Psalms 118:6**, **Romans 8:28-39**, and **Hebrews 13:5-6**).
  - 3. Carnal fear is not part of a disciple's mindset (II Timothy 1:7).

**John 14:28-29** "(28) Ye have heard how I said unto you, I go away, and come again unto you. If ye loved me, ye would rejoice, because I said, I go unto the Father: for my Father is greater than I. (29) And now I have told you before it come to pass, that, when it is come to pass, ye might believe."

- A. Going away and coming back again to them (John 14:3 and John 16:16) has many possible meanings:
  - 1. His resurrection after His death (Mark 8:31 and Luke 24:1-8; cf. Acts 1:1-3).
  - 2. The coming of the Holy Spirit (John 14:16-18 and John 15:7; 13-14).
  - 3. His return at the end of this world (I Thessalonians 4:13-18 and II Peter 3:9-10).
  - 4. He could even be referring to His omnipresence as deity (**Matthew 28:20**).
  - 5. This could also be a reference to His fellowship with the faithful (John 14:23, I John 1:3-7, and II John 9).
- B. If they loved Jesus they'd rejoice over these things (Luke 24:44-53).
  - 1. He's telling them some of these things for evidence of who He is (**John 13:18-19**).
  - 2. Prophecies provide assurance to believers (I Corinthians 14:22).
  - 3. We have these things written so that we can know as well (John 20:30-31).

**John 14:30-31** "(30) Hereafter I will not talk much with you: for the prince of this world cometh, and hath nothing in me. (31) But that the world may know that I love the Father; and as the Father gave me commandment, even so I do. Arise, let us go hence."

A. Jesus is nearly done talking, for His death is at hand (John 12:23 and John 13:31-32).

- 1. Even if He talked more, there's not much more they could bear (John 16:12).
- 2. Remember though, through the Holy Spirit, they'll be reminded of all that He has said (**John 14:26**).
- B. Jesus was continuing His obedience to the Father (John 4:34, John 12:27, Philippians 2:8, and Hebrews 5:8-9).
  - 1. The prince of this world (John 12:31, John 16:11, II Corinthians 4:3-4, and Ephesians 2:2) was coming.
    - a. It was not that Satan was just now making his mark on the world (**Job 1-2**, **Matthew 4:1-11**, **II Corinthians 11:3**, etc.).
    - b. The time was coming though when darkness would be accomplished through men (Luke 22:53).
  - 2. Though the prince of this world was coming, the obedience of Christ to the Father left Satan without charge against Christ (Hebrews 4:14-16, Hebrews 7:22-27, Hebrews 9:28, I Peter 1:18-19, and I Peter 2:21-22).
