## John 14:4-11

**John 14:4-5** "(4) And whither I go ye know, and the way ye know. (5) Thomas saith unto him, Lord, we know not whither thou goest; and how can we know the way?"

- A. They know where Jesus is going, for He has told them (John 6:62 and John 14:2-3).
  - 1. He has told them the way by telling them to follow Him (John 12:25-26).
  - 2. Jesus will continue to clarify where He is going (John 16:28), though they will not fully understand what He's telling them until after He has departed (John 14:28-29, John 16:4-5, John 16:17-18, and Acts 1:6-11; cf. John 12:15-16).
- B. Thomas is not quick in understanding or faith (John 20:19-29).
  - 1. Though Jesus just told them they knew the way, Thomas denies having such knowledge because he's not seeing things clearly (Mark 8:18 and Luke 24:25).
  - 2. Some people are very hard to teach (Hebrews 5:8-6:3).

**John 14:6-9** "(6) Jesus saith unto him, I am the way, the truth, and the life: no man cometh unto the Father, but by me. (7) If ye had known me, ye should have known my Father also: and from henceforth ye know him, and have seen him. (8) Philip saith unto him, Lord, shew us the Father, and it sufficeth us. (9) Jesus saith unto him, Have I been so long time with you, and yet hast thou not known me, Philip? he that hath seen me hath seen the Father; and how sayest thou then, Shew us the Father?"

- A. Jesus answers Thomas by showing He is the only way to the Father (Matthew 11:27, John 3:36, John 10:9, Acts 4:10-12, and I Timothy 2:5-6).
  - 1. Jesus established that He is the truth (John 1:14, John 1:17, and Ephesians 4:21).
  - 2. Jesus also established that He is the life (John 1:1-4, John 5:26, John 11:25, Colossians 3:1-4, I John 4:9, I John 5:11-12, and I John 5:20).
- B. If you know Jesus you know the Father (John 8:19).
  - 1. You've seen the Father when you've seen Christ (Hebrews 1:1-3).
  - 2. You cannot have one without the other (John 5:23, John 14:23, and II John 9).
  - 3. It is a sad thing to read Jesus asking Philip: "Have I been so long time with you, and yet hast thou not known me, Philip" (v.9; cf. Matthew 15:1-20 and Mark 16:14)?
- C. Philip wants to see the Father (Exodus 33:18-23).
  - 1. No earthly man has seen the Father (John 1:18, John 6:46, I John 4:12, and I John 4:20).
  - 2. Seeing God is something that comes in the future (**Matthew 5:8**; cf. **I John 3:1-**2).
  - 3. God is a Spirit (John 4:23-24), not a visible being (Colossians 1:12-15).
    - a. So, what about Jacob saying he saw God face to face (**Genesis 32:24-30**)?
    - b. It wasn't God the Father (Hosea 12:2-6).

**John 14:10-11** "(10) Believest thou not that I am in the Father, and the Father in me? the words that I speak unto you I speak not of myself: but the Father that dwelleth in me, he doeth the works. (11) Believe me that I am in the Father, and the Father in me: or else believe me for the very works' sake."

- A. Jesus questions whether or not they believe in Him, as faith is required to even begin the journey to Heaven (Acts 8:36-38, Romans 10:10, Hebrews 11:6, and I John 3:23).
  - 1. This chapter began with Jesus asking them to believe in Him as they do the Father (John 14:1).
  - 2. The twelve needed to grasp these things or they would be in sin (**John 8:23-24**), and find themselves reproved by the Spirit (**John 16:7-10**).
  - 3. A person's disbelief in Christ does not change who He is (II Timothy 2:13).
- B. Jesus is in the Father and the Father is in Jesus (John 17:20-23).
  - 1. God the Father and God the Son are one (John 10:30).
  - 2. In fact, the Holy Spirit is included in that unity as one (Matthew 28:19 and I John 5:7).
  - 3. Jesus proved that the Father was in Him (John 10:37-38).
