John 17:9-17

John 17:9-11 "(9) I pray for them: I pray not for the world, but for them which thou hast given me; for they are thine. (10) And all mine are thine, and thine are mine; and I am glorified in them. (11) And now I am no more in the world, but these are in the world, and I come to thee. Holy Father, keep through thine own name those whom thou hast given me, that they may be one, as we are."

- A. Jesus prayed for His disciples (Luke 22:31-32, John 14:16, and John 16:24-27).
 - 1. First, let it be made clear that Jesus certainly cares about people of the world in that He wants them to be saved (Matthew 9:13, Matthew 20:28, John 1:29, John 8:12, and I Timothy 1:15).
 - 2. Having said that, it should be no surprise that He would say that His prayer in this chapter is for the disciples rather than the world (Jeremiah 7:12-16, Jeremiah 11:11-14, and Jeremiah 14:10-12; cf. Proverbs 28:9).
 - 3. Jesus prayed for the disciples because those whom belong to Him also belong to the Father (I Corinthians 3:21-23, I John 1:3, and II John 9).
- B. As Jesus was preparing to leave the world (John 13:1-3 and John 16:28), He was mindful that He was leaving His disciples behind to carry out His work (Matthew 28:18-20).
 - 1. Jesus wants the disciples to continue in a relationship with the Father, which occurs through faith (I Peter 1:5).
 - 2. Jesus wants the disciples to be united as He and the Father are united (**Psalms 133:1**, **John 17:21**, **I Corinthians 1:10**, **Ephesians 4:1-6**, **Philippians 2:2**, **Philippians 3:16**, and **I Peter 3:8**).

John 17:12-14 "(12) While I was with them in the world, I kept them in thy name: those that thou gavest me I have kept, and none of them is lost, but the son of perdition; that the scripture might be fulfilled. (13) And now come I to thee; and these things I speak in the world, that they might have my joy fulfilled in themselves. (14) I have given them thy word; and the world hath hated them, because they are not of the world, even as I am not of the world."

- A. While Jesus was in the world He kept the disciples in line (John 10:27-28) with one exception (John 6:70-71).
 - 1. Jesus worked hard to keep the disciples on the right path (Matthew 8:23-27, Matthew 17:14-21, Luke 9:51-56, and Luke 22:24-32).
 - 2. Judas erring occurred so that the Scriptures could be fulfilled (Matthew 26:14-16 and Zechariah 11:12-13).
- B. Jesus has taught the disciples the words of the Father (**Matthew 13:10-11**, **John 14:10**, and **John 17:8**).
 - 1. The world hates faithful followers of the Lord (**Proverbs 29:27** and **Matthew 10:24-25).**

2. Disciples of Christ are not of the world (I John 4:1-6) and this is why we're hated by the world (John 15:18-21 and I John 3:12).

John 17:15-17 "(15) I pray not that thou shouldest take them out of the world, but that thou shouldest keep them from the evil. (16) They are not of the world, even as I am not of the world. (17) Sanctify them through thy truth: thy word is truth."

- A. Jesus did not ask for the disciples to be taken out of the world, for the world needs the truth to be taught (II Corinthians 4:1-7, Philippians 1:21-24, and Philippians 2:15).
 - 1. Jesus asking the Father to keep them from evil involved a miraculous intervention of the Holy Spirit (Acts 16:4-10 and Acts 27:17-26).
 - a. This was necessary as the Apostles were absolutely necessary for us to be saved (**Ephesians 2:19-20**).
 - b. This does not mean that Jesus was asking the Father to keep the disciples from committing sin (Matthew 26:41 and Colossians 1:21-23).
 - c. We can see that God did not keep the disciples from sinning (**John 18:1-14** and **Galatians 2:11-17**).
 - 2. We now know that the "age of miracles" has ceased (I Corinthians 13:8-13; cf. II Timothy 3:15-17).
- B. The disciples are not "of the world" (cf. I John 2:16).
 - 1. The world is polluted (II Peter 2:20).
 - 2. The world is evil (I John 5:19).
 - 3. Friendship with the world makes one an enemy of God (James 4:4).
 - 4. The principles of Christ are different than those of the world (Colossians 2:8).
- C. Jesus wants His disciples to be sanctified [made holy] (Leviticus 11:44, Leviticus 19:2, Leviticus 20:7, Ephesians 1:4, and I Peter 1:13-16).
 - 1. Obedience to the word of God makes one sanctified (II Thessalonians 2:13 and I Peter 1:22-25).
 - 2. The word of God is the truth (II Samuel 7:28, Psalms 119:142, Psalms 119:151, Ecclesiastes 12:10, Colossians 1:5, I Thessalonians 2:13, and James 1:18).
