Sometimes There Is A Wiser Decision

I. Introduction:

- A. A foolish decision is always the wrong decision (**Proverbs 19:3**) with severe consequences (**Psalms 5:4-5**).
 - 1. Some decisions of wisdom are clearly a choice of right or wrong (Matthew 25:1-13).
 - 2. This lesson is not intended to at all imply or downplay the need to be wise (**Ephesians 5:17**).
- B. Having said all of that, wisdom is a growth process (**Proverbs 1:1-5**).
 - 1. A wise individual can increase in wisdom (Proverbs 9:9).
 - 2. That does not necessarily mean wisdom will come with age though (**Job 32:9**).
 - 3. We just have to make sure our source of gaining wisdom is right (**Psalms 19:7** and **I Corinthians 3:18-19**).
- II. Body: Using Wisdom (**Proverbs 3:13-18**) Wherein There Is A Choice of More Than One Right (i.e. **Romans 14:14-21**).
 - A. Don't marry was the wisest decision at a certain time (I Corinthians 7:6-8 and I Corinthians 7:27-40).
 - 1. However, there was also wisdom in choosing to marry to avoid the temptation to commit fornication (I Corinthians 6:18-7:5 and I Corinthians 7:9).
 - 2. Even though marriage was not wise because persecution, that didn't make marrying a sinful choice (**Hebrews 13:4**).
 - B. Give financial support to Paul was the wisest decision (I Corinthians 9:11-14 and Philippians 4:11-17).
 - 1. The Corinthians allowed Paul to rob other churches, where was the wisdom in their allowance of his choice (**II Corinthians 11:8**)?
 - 2. Had they been wise, they'd consider what it meant not to be a burden (**II Corinthians 12:13-15**).
 - 3. Though, it was not as though he <u>had to</u> take money from them especially if a lesson could have been taught through such a refusal (**II Thessalonians 3:7-11**).
 - C. Learn was the right choice (Luke 10:38-42).
 - 1. Martha being hospitable wasn't wrong (I Peter 4:9).
 - 2. The wisest choice though was to sit at the feet of Jesus and learn from Him (Matthew 11:28-30 and John 6:63).
 - D. Some applications for us...
 - 1. Maybe it is lawful to go to a certain social gathering or entertainment function (I Corinthians 10:27), but because of potential temptations (I Corinthians 15:33 and I Peter 2:11) or mixed signals we'd send (Philippians 2:14-16) it is unwise.
 - 2. Maybe it is lawful to choose a certain job (**Ephesians 4:28**), but because of the potential demands of that job being a conflict

- (Matthew 6:33 and Colossians 3:1-4) or even the wrong motivation to work (Proverbs 23:4-5); that job may not be wise.
- 3. Maybe it is lawful to make a certain investment (**Proverbs** 21:20), but is it wise if that investment will lead us down dangerous roads (**Ephesians 5:3-5**; cf. **Matthew 6:19-21**)?
- 4. Maybe it is lawful to find a mate (**Proverbs 18:22**), but wisdom must be used in the choice (**I Kings 11:1-11**, **Proverbs 12:4**, **Proverbs 21:9**, and **Mark 3:25**).
- E. Consider then, how we should work to get wisdom (**Proverbs 4:5-7**).
 - 1. Obviously, wisdom is found in the Scriptures (Colossians 3:16).
 - 2. We can also find wisdom in wise counselors (**Proverbs 11:14** and **Acts 15:1-35**).
 - 3. You can also get wiser by being observant (**Proverbs 21:11-12**, **Proverbs 24:30-34**, and **I Corinthians 10:1-12**).
 - 4. Just don't count on your own self-wisdom (Isaiah 5:21).
- III. Conclusion: There are many benefits to wise decision-making (**Proverbs** 15:24, **Proverbs** 16:20, **Proverbs** 28:26, **Colossians** 4:5, and **James** 3:13-18).
