## **Straightened In Your Own Bowels**

## I. Introduction:

- A. We live in a world of predators that requires us to be on guard (**Psalms 39:1**, **Matthew 7:15-20**, and **Colossians 4:5-6**).
  - 1. We can't believe what people say or trust they don't have hidden agendas (**Proverbs 14:15**, **Proverbs 26:24-26**, and **Colossians 2:8**).
  - 2. We even know sometimes those closest to us can betray us (Micah 7:5-6, Matthew 10:36, Luke 22:47-48, and II Timothy 4:9-15).
- B. What if our guard gets so high we don't let anyone in? What if we get tired of being hurt? How can we be faithful in such a state?
  - 1. How can you love your brethren if you are constantly on guard (I Peter 3:8)?
  - 2. How can you let your brethren love you if you conceal your life because you are so on guard (i.e. I John 3:14-18)?
  - 3. How can you do good unto all if you never put yourself in a vulnerable position (**Galatians 6:9-10**)?
  - 4. Think about our example in Jesus (I Peter 2:21). Wasn't He hurt, mistreated, etc. (Mark 8:31)? Yet, He put even those that abused Him above Himself (Philippians 2:3-8).

## II. Body: II Corinthians 6:11-13

- A. Paul and Timothy (II Corinthians 1:1) spoke openly to the saints in Corinth (II Corinthians 3:12).
  - 1. We see that Jesus spoke and acted in the open (John 18:20).
  - 2. Paul and Timothy did not conceal themselves (II Corinthians 4:1-3).
  - 3. Their openness should have revealed the inward affection they had for their brethren (**II Corinthians 2:4**).
  - 4. Even in times of correction, a willingness to speak openly shows forth love (**Proverbs 27:5-6** and **Revelation 3:19**).
- B. Paul and Timothy did not close off their hearts to the saints (**II Corinthians** 7:1-3).
  - 1. Take time to think about what it means when a fellow saint says you are in their heart (**Philippians 1:3-8** and **I Thessalonians 2:14-20**).
  - 2. Paul was treating them as though they were his children as we see he did often with those he taught (Galatians 4:19, I Thessalonians 2:11, I Timothy 1:2, and Titus 1:4).
  - 3. He did all things for their sakes (II Corinthians 4:13-15 and II Corinthians 12:19).
  - 4. How that type of love would knit them together (**Colossians 2:2**).
  - 5. Such a thing begins with a sincere [unfeigned] love of the brethren (I Peter 1:22).

- C. The Corinthians were not reciprocating (I Corinthians 4:1-15).
  - 1. Think about how Paul felt (II Corinthians 12:13-15).
  - 2. They should have known better and should have highly esteemed Paul (I Thessalonians 5:12-13).
  - 3. It would have been nice if they just would have realized Paul would love to be treated and cared for as he was doing for them (**Luke 6:31**).
- D. Brethren, don't be like the Corinthians. Though it may make you vulnerable, be open to your brethren and relate with one another (**Romans 12:10**).
  - 1. Brotherly love is not a one day affair (Hebrews 13:1).
  - 2. Being mindful that when you're with faithful saints you are amongst a spiritual family (**Ephesians 3:15**).
  - 3. How could we confess our faults to one another (**James 5:16**), if we are on guard or felt like we wouldn't receive the help to be restored (**Galatians 6:1-2**)?
  - 4. We want to know one another as we see great efforts Paul made to accomplish this even when he was physically hindered [i.e. imprisoned] (**Philippians 2:19**).
- III. Conclusion: Have the endurance to get through the abuses we face in this life and continue to do good as we can see Jesus did (**Hebrews 12:1-3**).
